Criterion 3 Teaching and Learning: Quality, Resources, and Support – *The institution provides quality education, wherever and however its offerings are delivered.*

3.A. The rigor of the institution's academic offerings is appropriate to higher education.

- MATC Examples:
 - o PACs ensure academic offerings are consistent with industry needs
 - Accreditation/Certification Organizations ensure academic integrity and consistency with national standards
 - Program Alignment through KBOR
 - Curriculum Committee gives faculty input & sees that courses are academically sound, comprehensive, and current
 - Instructors participate in professional development to keep their programs/courses current & find best practices
 - Standardized syllabus template and minimum faculty qualifications keep program quality consistent across all modes of delivery and locations.
- Possible Evidence:
 - Academic catalog
 - Documentation that the institution follows federal policy for credit hour requirements, where appropriate
 - Agendas and minutes from faculty senate and/or curriculum committee meetings
 - Examples of course- and program-learning goals for each degree level across all modes and locations
 - A syllabus template or guidelines for course outlines
 - Documentation that supports the method in which the institution determines program levels (e.g., Bloom's Taxonomy, etc.)
 - o Program-level admission requirements
 - External reviews conducted of programs

3.B. The institution offers programs that engage students in collecting, analyzing and communicating information; in mastering modes of intellectual inquiry or creative work; and in developing skills adaptable to changing environments.

- MATC Examples:
 - o General Education learning outcomes found in Catalog, correlate with the Core abilities
 - o MATC Diversity- women in male dominated fields and vice versa, adults, ESL students
- Possible Evidence:
 - o Documentation of the process for developing curriculum and course outlines
 - o List of graduate and undergraduate internship and practicum program sites
 - Agendas and minutes of committees related to educational programs
 - Departmental improvement plans
 - Agendas, minutes, and activities of multicultural committees
 - General education learning goals and curriculum
 - Notification from the state that the institution meets state requirements for general education coursework
 - Notable faculty and student achievements relative to scholarship and creative work
 - Dual credit guidelines
 - Documentation that programs meet programmatic accreditation requirements

3.C. The institution has the faculty and staff needed for effective, high-quality programs and student services.

MATC Examples:

- Average length of employment for faculty is 4.67 years (2021), average faculty to student ratio is 16:1
- Application process and instructor approval certify that all faculty are qualified to teach
- o Faculty evaluations are on rotation based on length of employment
- Instructors are accessible to students office hours on door schedules and starfish calendar
- o Faculty have student services, admin, and program assistants for assistance

Possible Evidence:

- Statement on faculty expectations and minimum qualifications
- Student-to-faculty ration (overall, on-ground, online)
- Faculty handbook
- Summary of qualifications of Student Affairs staff
- Documentation of professional development and training opportunities for staff and faculty, including support for instructional design
- Sabbatical policy
- Complete faculty roster
- Guidelines for hiring faculty
- o Faculty and staff professional development plans and annual evaluations
- Orientation program for all faculty

3.D. The institution provides support for student learning and resources for effective teaching.

MATC Examples:

- List of responsibilities for Student Services Staff & Financial Services
- o retention
- Teaching and Learning Center, Regional Testing Center

Possible Evidence:

- Student handbook
- Academic catalog
- List of student support services, disability services, financial aid, advising, career counseling, campus childcare, cocurricular activities, and health services (for all modalities)
- Information about writing and math assistance, tutoring programs, or other support provided to students
- Schedule or documentation of student activities, programming, or activities
- List of veterans' affairs office activities
- Listing of remedial or developmental courses
- Documentation on how campus advising works (matriculation through graduation)
- o Information about computer labs, clinical sites, scientific labs, and performance spaces
- First-year experience program (academic & cocurricular)
- Plagiarism and academic integrity training
- o Information about libraries and resources (e.g., interlibrary loan, reference services, Ask a Librarian)
- Information about utilization of data from internal resources and external national surveys, such as the National Survey of Student Engagement or Community College Survey of Student Engagement
